
Writing a Video Script



1) What is Your Brief?

A few things to consider before you begin...

- What is the purpose of the video, why are you making the video?
- Who is your audience? Who is the video aimed at?
- What is the video about, what's the topic? Keep this in mind!
- What's the message you want to convey, when your audience is finished watching the video what is the core message you want them to take away from your video

2) Writing the Script

Once you have written out your brief it is time to write your actual script...

- Briefly Introduce yourself who you are, what is your role and your home institution or enterprise! (10 seconds)
- Include your overall message in the first 20-30 seconds of the video. Start by trying to condense the core message of your video into one or two sentences and place it at the start of the script.
- A recommended pace to maintain when creating a video script is to write approximately 125 words per minute of video. For example, a 5 minute video would contain approximately 600-650 words.
- Do not overcomplicate your sentences. Try to keep the word count below about 60 characters per sentence. Take a brief pause between each sentence allowing yourself time to breathe.
- It is also recommended to further split your video script into appropriate paragraphs. Between these paragraphs give yourself 3-5 secs of a pause.

3) Which word processor (or text editor) to use

The script itself just needs to be a text file for loading into the teleprompter. So you may use any word processor (e.g. Libre Office) or text editor (e.g. Emacs) you choose.
